

#### Meet Booklover Elliana Kong (8.4)





Hi everyone, my name is Elliana from Year 8. I like spending my free time reading. Whether at school or at home, I would always bury my head in books that I really enjoy. I really love reading because the way the author has set up the books arouses my curiosity enormously.

#### When did you start reading and what has inspired you to read?

I migrated to Australia so I started reading English storybooks when I was around seven years old. My mum brought me to the local library to borrow books, would read and explain words I didn't understand. I stopped reading for a while but in Year 4, I began to read again. I have to thank my mum's determination and persistence in improving my literacy.

#### What particular novel could you not put down?

This was "The Land of Stories" series ("Worlds Collide") by Chris Colfer. I imagined losing myself in those imaginary scenarios with the characters in the authors' marvellous descriptions. I was awed when my mum bought the books as it was the first series I read, and all the impossible mystical creatures and scenarios became possible through the author's magical words!

#### What two other novels would you recommend?

I would recommend "The School for Good and Evil" by Soman Chainani and "The Medoran Chronicles" by Lynette Noni. The novels have similar characteristics for the antagonists and protagonists except the storylines are different. I prefer storylines that are mysterious and adventurous. I believe most young readers like books that have multiple missions and problems to solve, plus shocking and twisted endings. Reading books would not be fun if there is no chase on a mission!

#### Do you think reading has helped you with your studies? Please tell us how.

Not only reading improves your language but also your vocabulary, grammar, and comprehension. Yet reading could also simply be a habit we all enjoy. I know that my English has improved a lot in the past few years since I started reading books. I know more words and meanings. My sentence structure has become more fluent and concise. When it comes to comprehension, I also have a deeper understanding since I have come across words that I am familiar with.

#### Are there any strategies you can share with other students to start developing good reading habits?

If you really want to excel in English by developing reading skills, set yourself goals, such as reading at least how many chapters a day, or time yourself. I don't really like to time myself because I am giving myself invisible pressure. I read with the flow. I would eventually feel tired after reading 3-5 chapters, that is around 30-40 minutes, then I would stop reading and do something else. If you have only started reading books, then it is best to set yourself a time starting from 10 minutes then expand it.

#### Please tell us about yourself.

I'm a slightly introverted person who does not mind going out and talking to people but would rather be on the couch with a good book or movie. I am and always will be a Harry Potter and Fantastic Beasts fan!

#### When did you start reading and what has inspired you to read?

I started reading from a very young age – around 4 or 5 years of age. I think I was inspired by the folk tales my grandparents used to tell me, and I wanted to hear/read more stories like those.

#### What particular novel could you not put down and why?

I enjoyed reading "We Were Liars" (E. Lockhart). They were such captivating characters and an interesting storyline.

#### What two other novels would you recommend to young readers like you and why?

I would recommend "Maze Runner" by James Dasher. I loved the style of writing and the wat the characters were written. It really made me think about who was in the right or wrong in the story.

I would also recommend "Howl's Moving Castle" by Diana Wyne Jones. It's a fun, whimsical book with a great magic world and very detailed storyline.

#### Do you think reading has helped you with your studies? Please tell us how?

I think reading has helped with my studies as it has taught me to manage my time, otherwise I get carried away in a good book! It has also helped me expand my vocabulary and makes me think and see things from a different perspective.

#### Are there any strategies you can share with other students to start developing good reading habits?

If you are afraid of committing to a new book, do not buy it but borrow it from a library. Sometimes picking up a new book is harder than putting one down but if you get started reading, you will gain the motivation to continue reading.


